The 2006 budget prepared by Purser Linda Ubelacker was submitted to the membership and approved. It was noted that there is a financial problem created by the need to purchase Officers and Directors Liability Insurance. Steve discussed this issue at length with the members, who in the end had to reluctantly accept the requirement. This discussion is presented in the Commodore's Corner. CBYCA Delegate Tom Powers reported that most of the member clubs have not dealt

Commodore's Corner

The Season.

Welcome to the 2006 Sailing Season and the adventures this year will bring. The schedule is ready and so are the people who have volunteered to be raft and cruise leaders. Come out, bring your crews, and boats for another season of fun in the sun.

This winter was a busy one for the club leadership. As you might remember last July, Boat/US published an article about liability insurance for recreational boating organizations. So, the leadership of our club spent a good deal of time researching and discussing the eventual purchase of our club's insurance coverage. More on that follows.

Let us all make the 2006 Sailing Season be our season to refresh ourselves on safety while sailing. Bill Fowler is putting together a fantastic safety program for the club. His articles will be appearing in the Portlight regularly. Also, don't forget to ask a member of the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary to inspect your boat to make sure you have all of the safety equipment you need. These inspections are free and very educational.

Again, welcome to the 2006 sailing season. Check out the schedule frequently, volunteer your time to lead a cruise or raft-up, and come out to have fun. See you on the water.

Why Insurance?

Safety on the water is always a must. Sailing is an inherently dangerous sport, as is all boating activities. And, we all have experienced the more interesting incidents that take place on the water every day.

In the article that Boat/US published in their July 2005 magazine, they pointed out the need for liability insurance, both as a boat owner and as a club. In today's litigious society it just makes good sense that we invested in insurance coverage for the club and its officers and directors.

As we researched our options, we turned to CBYCA, who was struggling with the same issue. But, like people, each club is unique and the market for club insurance is limited.

Some of us are business owners and executives who have had the experience of dealing with potential lawsuits, be they legitimate or not. Lawsuits can come for just about anything at any time. Our club does involve itself in activities that could expose us to such legal activities.

We engage in an inherently dangerous sport in an inherently dangerous environment. We serve and consume alcohol at activities and events. And, we all have seen the behaviors of other boaters, drivers, and so forth.

If the club or one of its leaders, and this includes raft and cruise captains, is named in a lawsuit, it generally will cost more than \$5,000 just to be removed from a lawsuit if innocent of any wrongdoing. If the club or one of its leaders is at fault, the ramifications can be catastrophic. Without insurance, who would pay for that? Boat owner insurance, homeowners, or other business liability insurances we might have do not typically cover such issues.

Like our cars, our homes, our businesses, and everything else in our lives, insurance is the answer to protecting ourselves from these liabilities. Our club's insurance does cover the officers, committees, and those who volunteer their time to lead cruises and raft-ups, as well as the general liabilities that might occur.

With that awareness of liability beyond the decks of our boats, this whole insurance issue also raises the awareness for safety matters, as well. So, I am asking each member to take the time to inspect the seaworthiness of your vessel, be sure your crew knows where safety and medical equipment is located and how to use it, and check your insurance to determine what it covers and does not cover. Take full advantage of the free services of the Power Squadron and the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary, and be sure to read Bill Fowler's articles about safety in the Portlight.

Let us all have a safe and carefree sailing season in 2006.

CONGRATULATIONS, Wayne Morris (*Irish Fever*) and the leadership of the Southern Bay Hunter Sailing Association. They told us at the Rendezvous last year that they would try to start up a club in the Tidewater area (Norfolk) of the Bay, and it appears that they are succeeding. with this issue, but he would report back to CBYCA Directors that there should be some urgency transmitted to their member clubs. We hope that most or all the member clubs will determine a need for such insurance and that a group rate will be available to all in the near future. The financial issue was deferred to a future meeting.

Tom Powers also discussed the issue of a Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG) terminal at Sparrows Point. He told us that the CBYCA is and will continue to lobby against it on the grounds of safety and the adverse impact on navigation on the upper Bay. Tom also said that many of the Maryland Legislators and the Governor are not in favor of this location. There will be much more to come on this, so **Tom asked everyone to continue to monitor events via the CBYCA website and to write their state representative with their own thoughts on the issue.** [NOTE: To find your Maryland State Representative go to <http://mlis.state.md.us/> on the internet. Ed.] Tom's final remark was about members displaying the CBYCA burgee and/or decal to "show the flag around the Bay." He will report back to us in person or in the Portlight about arrangements to get these materials to NSHSA members and the costs.

Following Tom Powers' remarks, Steve Hornberger commented about the "new" requirement to notify the FAA (tower) at Martin State Airport by telephone if your mast is 37' or higher when transiting on Frog Mortar Creek past the end of the runways. This notice has been posted on the US Coast Guard 5th District Local Notice to Mariners. Anyway, Steve's remarks caused some discussion and speculation about the numbers of telephone calls to be made during any weekend day on the Creek and how that will effect this requirement. [NOTE: This notice did NOT appear in the latest LNM online. I don't know what this means; furthermore, attempts to call the tower on the telephone number provided went unanswered. Ed.]

Other than the insurance issue, the main feature of the meeting was the 2006 Sailing Schedule. A preliminary schedule, developed earlier by the Executive

Committee, had been presented in the Jan/Feb issue of the Portlight and on the website. Hard copies were made available for this meeting. The results of this discussion appear elsewhere in this issue and on the website. The following specifics were added to the existing schedule:

- 29-30 April; a joint raft up with HSA#1 on Bodkin Creek to discuss the Rendezvous 2007.
- 27-29 May; Memorial Day Weekend on Worton



Creek hosted by *Tomorrow Came & Sun Runner*.

- 17-18 June; Safety Raft up hosted by *Callisto*. Activities being considered are man overboard, safety inspections.
- 22-23 July; Beach Party at Tolchester Marina (rain or shine), hosted by *Mosella*.
- 4-6 August; Governor's Cup Race – *Carpe Ventum* will participate. Chris thinks he has enough crew, **but anybody interested should contact Chris directly.**
- 19-20 August; Christmas in August raft, hosted by *Dolphin*.
- ?? September; Fall Cruise to the Choptank hosted by *Sun Runner*.

Joe Cameron reported on his planning for the Block Island Cruise, 17 June to 2 July. Except for the start date on Bohemia River and the objective to return to the Bay by the first weekend in July, everything is flexible and weather dependent. Joe indicated that they might return to the Bay via Hampton Roads. He reported that so far *Aquila* will be the only boat on his cruise; *Carpe Ventum* has planned to go earlier in June and HSA#1 will be going in July. **Anyone interested in cruising to Block Island and back this summer should contact these NSHSA skippers and/or the HSA#1 Commodore directly.**

Kent Volosin reported on his planning for the Southern Bay Cruise in July. He reported that the only fixed plan was to be at the Tides Inn on the Rappahannock over the 4th of July. He is making slip reservations for those three days, 3-6 July, at the Tides for those interested. Everything else either side of those dates is open for individual or group transit. **Interested members should contact Kent with their plans.**

Jay Eaton reported on the plans for the Annual Picnic at Tidewater the weekend AFTER Labor Day. We have a commitment from Tidewater for free slips Friday and Saturday (8 & 9 Sep) as well as beer and a tent. The theme for the event will be a New England Clambake – it could be Maryland-ized with crab. Because of our financial situation, we asked whether or not members would be willing to pay about \$20/boat for the event. The results of the discussion were positive.

Earl Greene reported that he is working on more joint raft ups with HSA#1. They were a big hit in 2005. He also reminded everyone about his raft up in May on Rock Creek. [Now in June on the Magothy]

Finally, Steve reminded all about other items on the schedule:

- Volvo Ocean Race is coming to Baltimore. *Windkist 4* will be hosting a raft up to coincide with the race re-start on 6 & 7 May.
- Tidewater Open House, typically in May. [Changed to 22 April - See "Mark Thy Calendar" on page 1] **He asked us all to support Tidewater by being there.**
- Labor Day weekend is still an open date for a raft up. **We need a member to commit to host something**

Frigid Digit Shakedown

The crew of *Carpe Ventum* hustled down to the marina at 1400 hours on Saturday April 1st, to be greeted by winds blowing 25 and gusting to 40 knots. After a brief discussion with the captain of *Silent Running* it was decided that we shouldn't pass up an opportunity like this to practice docking, or undocking maneuvers in a high cross wind situation. With a little extra planning and effort both vessel slipped their lines and glided onto the river without incident. We were met out on the water by *Aquila* and preceded to cross the bay to Fairlee Creek. None of the vessels had headsails bent this early in the season and although the main sails were all ready for service discretion won out, and we decided to give the engine a thorough spring shakedown all the way across the bay. An extra knot of speed with bare poles was icing on the cake as we approached the entrance ahead of schedule.

Despite the strong westerly wind, the tide seemed lower than usual as we approached the narrow cut. *Carpe Ventum* never saw less than 6.5 feet as she stayed in the center of the channel. Next up, *Silent Running* found a shallow spot and stopped to admire it for a few seconds before backing up and proceeding around it. Not to be out-done, *Aquila* was able to stop and enjoy two areas of shallow water on her way into the creek. At 1600 hours *Carpe Ventum* dropped the hook and was quickly joined by *Silent Running* and *Aquila*. I checked the GPS to make sure I was in the same Fairlee Creek that typically hosts hundreds of anchored vessels as I counted a grand total of 6 boats in the entire anchorage. Inside the well-protected creek we had a peaceful 10 to 15 knot breeze.

We began our celebration of the new sailing season by sunning ourselves and enjoying a beer on the fore-deck of *Carpe Ventum*. As the sun sank lower and the clouds interfered we moved to the cockpit of *Aquila* to



share some appetizers and cocktails. Time flew by and it soon began to grow dark, so we adjourned to cook dinner. After dinner we gathered together aboard *Silent Running* to

enjoy the movie: "Hitch." After the movie we had the pleasure of seeing thousands of twinkling stars in the crystal clear sky and reflected in the peaceful water. What a day... What a night... and now for the first night in a sea berth in months; it doesn't get any better than this.

Sunday morning dawned clear and bright, and we soon all got to work. We gave each other a hand bending on our respective headsails and attended to some other spring tune-up activities. We



departed the creek on the high tide at 1300 hours and escaped to deep water without incident. The winds started out light and variable, so we tried to coax a little extra speed from the main sail as we began motoring home. In a short time however the southeast winds grew to 10 knots occasionally gusting higher, and we shut off the motor to enjoy a nearly effortless sail home at 5 to 6 knots. A beautiful sunny sail to cap off a great shakedown cruise and all systems are go for a wonderful 2006 sailing season.

If you didn't partake in the Aprils Fools raft-up because you thought it was a joke, then the joke is on you.

Guidance for Cruise and Raft Up Captains

General. The Cruise Captain is aboard the flagship of the fleet during a Raft-up, Cruise or Rendezvous. He or she is in charge of everything associated with the event. It begins with the planning and ends with a report to the Portlight Editor. Being Cruise Captain should not be a daunting task; in fact, it should be fun. So advice and support should be sought from the Officers and/or other experienced NSHSA members.

PLANNING. The Cruise/Raft-up Captain is responsible to:

- Select a theme for the event,
- Determine the location and time of the event,
- Define the requirements for the event; e.g., costumes, decorations,
- Solicit specific support for the event, including a photographer,
- If club funds are needed for the event, contact the Commodore and Purser,
- Develop and distribute the flyer announcing the event.



ORGANIZATION. The Captain should be first to arrive at the site.

- For anchorages, choose the location considering bottom, depth, weather, other boats, etc.
- Put down an adequate anchor with a little excessive scope, based on raft size, swing room.
- For dockage, determine all the slip locations for the expected fleet.
- Monitor VHF 78 throughout the event to direct members as they arrive and control the raft.
- Organize and instruct the support crews to assist in building the raft or docking arriving boats. There are typically many volunteers for this effort.
- Balance the raft, considering boat length and displacement, on the anchored boat(s).
- Seek advice, if necessary. Involve the skippers of the boats to be rafted together.

JOINING VESSELS. Skippers of vessels joining the raft are responsible to:

- Communicate with the Cruise/Raft Captain on VHF 78,
- Provide 2 adequate sized docklines, fore and aft,
- Provide 2 adequate sized fenders,
- Provide 1 or more adequate sized spring lines (keep spreaders apart).



RAFT INTEGRITY. Cruise/Raft up Captain is responsible for raft integrity and safety.

- Monitor wind and weather conditions.
- Monitor raft size, balance, ground tackle holding, swing room, general sense of stability.
- Determine if the raft needs to break up; direct the break up.

EVENT HOST. The Captain is the Host and Master of Ceremonies. He or she directs.

DISSOLUTION. Cruise/Raft-up Captain is responsible to:

- Oversee the dissolution of the raft after completion of the event or earlier,
- Support the departure of the fleet from the dock area, as necessary,
- Monitor VHF 78 to graciously and humbly respond to any plaudits you may receive.

POST MORTEM. After the Cruise/Raft-up, the Captain must:

- Provide a written report to the Editor of the Portlight. As a minimum, identify all the participants. Submit not later than two weeks following the event.
- Ensure any photos are supplied to the Editor of the Portlight and the Historian.
- Submit any information to the NSHSA Webmaster for inclusion on the Home Page.
